

Behaviour at Budbrooke - information for parents

At Budbrooke Primary School, we nurture a safe and inclusive environment, where exemplary behaviour is at the heart of productive learning- our one-word school rule is

'consideration'. It is our role to educate our pupils to understand how their behaviour can affect and impact on others.

We prepare learners to be responsible and self-disciplined members of a diverse society. We believe that implementing the principles of Restorative Practice helps us to focus on building better relationships with each other; taking the time to ensure that every member of our school community feels listened to, valued and respected. We support pupils in developing the skills to maintain positive relationships with others and to resolve disagreements and problems themselves. It is our role to educate our pupils to understand how their behaviour can affect and impact on others. Pupils are supported to identify ways they can put right the harm they have caused. At Budbrooke Primary School, we strive to help pupils become empathic, considerate people who have the skills to avoid and resolve problems independently.

Some pupils with social, emotional, or mental health difficulties require time to calm down and this is an important part of developing a pupil's self-management skills. 'Time outs' can be offered to pupils before an incident is dealt with.

All those who work with the school (pupils, staff, parents, Governors and the wider community) have a vital role to play. As members of the school community, all stakeholders should build positive relationships with each other and individuals are expected to consider and respect others, their families, cultures and beliefs.

Promoting Positive Behaviour

At Budbrooke we celebrate and promote positive behaviour for learning, for our school community and for life. This is achieved through our one-word school rule of **consideration** and our other core values, encouraging all pupils to aspire to the high standards that we set for them. Our five core values are:

Consideration Confidence Collaboration Curiosity

Challenge

These are clearly displayed in each classroom Positive behaviour is promoted by:

- Awarding stickers
- Stamping the work with a positive praise stamp

- Positive verbal feedback
- Stars
- Certificates are awarded by class teachers in a weekly assembly to recognise personal learning achievements, parents are invited in and names are recorded on the weekly newsletter
- Lunchtime stars
- Certificates are awarded by lunchtime supervisors in a weekly assembly to recognise behaviour that exceeds expectations at lunchtime and are recorded on the weekly newsletter
- Writer of the Week/Mathematician of the Week.
- Values tokens and core value pens and pencilsTokens are given to pupils by staff when they have shown a core value. The token is placed in the corresponding value box. Tickets are drawn and winners for each value are shared with the whole school and are communicated on the school newsletter. Winners receive a Budbrooke pen/pencil in recognition for demonstrating the core value
- Showing work that exceeds expectations to other members of staff, including the Acting Head of School
- End of year Headteacher's award

Dealing with inappropriate behaviour

When behaviour compromises safety and prevents productive learning for the individual or impacts on the rights of others to learn and be safe then the behaviour policy is followed (please use the link below to read the policy)

Budbrooke recognises that all pupils are individuals and therefore the strategies may be adapted for individual and group needs. We recognise that some pupils may have behavioural needs that extend beyond these strategies, where this is the case a personal positive intervention plan written by SLT and the SENCO will be shared with all staff and must be followed.

Behaviour at playtimes and lunchtimes

Promoting positive behaviour

- Pupils are able to gain a values token for displaying the five core values when they are on the playground.
- Pupils are able to gain a lunchtime award certificate that is presented during a whole school assembly and celebrated on the weekly newsletter
- Play leaders work with pupils to model playground games and model appropriate behaviour on the playground

Dealing with inappropriate behaviour

Playground rules are displayed around the school and pupils are familiar with these. The school phrase 'Stop it please' should be used by pupils if the actions of others are making them feel unsafe and they are encouraged to use this with their peers on the playground. If the behaviour continues then pupils must report this to an adult. Early intervention at this point can prevent incidents of conflict from escalating. Midday supervisors should follow the stages below:

Willow - The peaceful place




We are pleased to introduce Willow - the peaceful place to you all as part of our commitment to ensuring the mental health and well-being of all our pupils. Willow is a space for quiet time and reflection and is available to be accessed by all of our pupils to ensure that they have a clam and relaxing space to be able to take some time before being able to begin to learn again. At Budbrooke we believe that pupils learn best when they are regulated and calm and this space will help to achieve this. This room contains objects including weighted blankets, calming lighting and a variety of books about some of the emotions that they may be experiencing to support them during their time in Willow with an adult. The space was named by a pupil and is already having a significant impact on some of our pupils, with one pupil saying that 'it was the best place in the world' and that they valued the space because it 'gave them time to reflect and be ready for the school day ahead'. I am sure that you will agree that this space will continue to have an immeasurable impact for all who use it.

This space was made possible through the support from the Budbrooke PTA and a grant from Warwickshire County Council. We were visited today by Jan Matecki and representatives from the PTA to see the room and discuss the impact that it has already had. We would like to extend our huge and heartfelt thanks to them all for allowing us to facilitate such an invaluable provision for our pupils.



Science Fair Project 2025



British Science Week is entering its third decade in 2025, taking place from 7th-16th March, and the theme to mark the start of this new era is 'Change and adapt'. All the children across the school will be taking part in scientific experiments as part of our science lessons during this week.

As part of this, we are excited to announce the launch of our Science Fair Project competition. This is a fantastic opportunity for children to work together with their families to investigate an area of science that interests them and share their findings with the school community.

For this competition, we would like children to pose a **science-based question**, then research, experiment and present what they find out. For example; Does the angle of a ramp change the distance a toy car will travel? Which liquid makes a surface the most slippery? Does the colour of water affect the time it takes to freeze? Which surface will make a car move faster? There is no suggested theme so they are free to get your inspiration from the world around you and choose something that interests and inspires you. Remember it does not need to involve expensive materials – sometimes the simplest ideas are the best!

Projects can be completed individually or as a family group. Siblings may enjoy working together.

Children will ideally present their project on a 3-part notice board that can sit on a table top (see an example here). A cut-up supermarket cardboard box, taped together and covered in wrapping paper is ideal. Any models made need to fit in the space in the middle of the board.

Projects **must be submitted to school by Friday 7th March**. This is to allow judging and showcasing of entries to take place. On Monday 10th March, children and families may come into school to view their own and others science investigations between 3.20-3.40pm at our Science fair in the main school hall. The winners will be announced on Friday 14th March.

The projects will be judged on their Content, Visual Display and the children's ability to communicate their findings. All entries will get a Homework Hero star, and there will be a prize for the overall KS1 and KS2 winner.

School Uniform

SCHOOL UNIFORM

At Budbrooke we pride ourselves in being smart, well presented and ready for learning.

Uniform list (non PE days):

- School logo sweatshirt/cardigan
- Pale blue polo shirt
- Mid-grey skirt, pinafore dress, trousers or shorts
- Plain dark socks to be worn under trousers, dark grey socks or tights to be worn with skirts/pinafore dresses

- Black plain shoes. Trainers are only to be worn for PE
- Pale blue/white checked dresses (optional) may be worn from the Summer Term until Autumn Half Term with white socks.
- Dark coloured coat.





Jewellery, Hair Ornaments, Make-up and Nail Varnish

For many reasons, including safety, we do not allow children to wear jewellery. The exceptions to this rule are earring studs in pierced ears. Children are required to remove these during PE lessons to prevent them from causing injury. If for some reason they cannot be removed, they must be taped over.

Please note: Teachers are not permitted to remove earrings.

- Hair bands, ribbons/bows should be plain
- Make up and nail varnish should not be worn to school, this includes temporary false or acrylic nails.

Watches Analogue and digital watches are acceptable when your child is able to tell the time.

SMART watches are not allowed due to safeguarding.


